About Stan Rogers

Stan Rogers, born in Hamilton, Ontario on November 19, 1949, was a man of Maritime stock on both sides of the family. Stan got his start in music when one of his uncles made him his first guitar when he was 5 years old, out of Ontario birch, welding rods and an old toothbrush. Stan grew to be a big man, tall, and with a deep rumbling voice, widely admired for his poignant lyrics and passionate musical style. Unfortunately for us, Stan died tragically in a fire on Air Canada flight 797 at the Cincinatti, Ohio airport on June 2, 1983. He had been returning from a folk festival in Kerrville, Texas. Stan was posthumously awarded the Diplôme d'Honneur by the Canadian Conference of the Arts

Atlantic Voices: Our Mascot



Director's Note

It usually starts in a pub when we are young, shouting out "Barrett's Privateers," saying "God damn them all" to an entire world of people trying to push us down. All of Stan's songs were the work of a young man, of course, yet delivered in a voice aged beyond his years, that bass-baritone that was so unfashionable in an era when everyone seemed to be singing in a falsetto.

We would learn them and make the songs our own before we even knew the singer. The songs made their rounds and touched hearts independent of Stan's recordings. I remember performing an ill-advised punk version of "The Mary Ellen Carter" and being severely reprimanded for it by a certain well-known Cape Breton singer. But looking back now, I'm not sure I had even heard Stan's rendition at the time.

Yes, his songs were those of a young man, full of diatribes against the "smiling bastards" and sweeping political statements fuelled by raw passion, not cold analysis. But paradoxically, his greatest gift might have been his ability to inhabit the heads of the old, those bewildered and lost in a changed world. His songs about the inshore fishery ring true not only because of his careful imagining of the place and his way with particular, strange, and exact local words. The songs strike us as genuine because he is so gifted at taking his young self out of the picture to let his aging and often beaten characters speak for themselves.

As we grew and our vision expanded, we found the songs growing with us. There were songs like "The Idiot" in which realism pushed back against nostalgia, the winner of the struggle being unclear. There were stirring anthems for parts of the country we weren't even sure we felt at home in. There were songs like "Forty-Five Years," about a love born not in innocence but in hard experience, or my own favourite, "Lock-keeper," about a man being mocked for choosing home and quiet happiness over the more obvious thrills of adventure, freedom, and life on the road.

Stan Rogers' recording career lasted only the seven years between Fogarty's Cove and From Fresh Water. Yet his compositions seem to be the work of a much longer lifetime. In their incredible range and sensitivity, the songs grow old with us, though the singer didn't get that chance.

Program Notes

Watching the Apples Grow

Written for William Davis, premier of Ontario at the time, who asked, "Ontario! Is there any place you'd rather be?"... to which Stan replied, "You betcha, Bill."

Make and Break Harbour

This is a touching song about the Maritime inland fishery. This song was Stan's sadly ironic way of describing exactly the status of the inland fisheries as seen through the eyes of many a fisherman out of a job.

Fogarty's Cove

Stan Rogers was first moved to write about Nova Scotia's Eastern Shore in response to a request from his Aunt June Jarvis. "Fogarty's Cove" was the result, the beginning of his series of Maritime songs. Although you won't find it on the map, if you trace along the shore of Chedabucto Bay from Guysborough north-east toward Canso Town, you will find names like Half Way Cove, Queensport, Half Island Cove, Fox Island, Hazel Hill and, of course, Canso.

Bluenose

From the film "Bluenose N.S. 116", produced by the Government of Nova Scotia, this song is proud description of that famous schooner which appears on our dime – The Bluenose. Fishing schooners became obsolete after World War II, and despite all best efforts to keep her in Nova Scotia, the Bluenose was sold to work as a freighter in the West Indies. She foundered on a Haitian reef and was lost on January 28, 1946.

The Mary Ellen Carter

This song is intended as an inspirational hymn about triumphing over great odds. It tells the story of a heroic effort to salvage a sunken ship, the Mary Ellen Carter, by members of her former crew. It is one of the most popular songs written by Rogers.

Maid on the Shore

A traditional Newfoundland tune which Stan learned from a couple Annapolis Valley boys with whom he had shared an apartment in London Ontario.

Northwest Passage

This anthemic song recalls the history of early explorers who were trying to discover a route across Canada to the Pacific Ocean, its central theme is a comparison between the journeys of these past explorers and the singer's own journey to and through the same region. The singer ultimately reflects that, just as the quest for a northwest passage might be considered a fruitless one (in that a viable and navigable Northwest Passage was never found in the days of Franklin and his kind), a modern-day sojourner along similar paths might meet the same end.

The Field Behind the Plow

A heartfelt song written about the disappearing farming life, and the hardships faced by Canadian farmers who keep holding on, through good times and bad.

Tiny Fish for Japan

On his final album, released after his death, Stan turned his gaze on Ontario. In Tiny Fish for Japan, we hear the voices of Great Lakes fishermen watching bewildered as their way of life turns into just another job. They have become tiny players in an international industry that processes smelt, a species the fishermen don't even consider food, and ships it halfway around the globe.

The Brass Band of the Cove

The second place Atlantic Voices choral competition prize goes to The Brass Band of the Cove composed by Kurt Walther of Ottawa. This song, with text written by the composer himself, commemorates the brass band tradition of the Newfoundland and Labrador outports.

Three Songs of the Sea

The first-ever Atlantic Voices choral composition contest winner is Three Songs of the Sea by Timothy Cooper of New Brunswick! Cooper has created a multi-movement work based on three lovely poems by the New Brunswick writer Bliss Carman.

Marguerite

Scott explains the history of the song: "Written by a young man very much under the influence of Stan Rogers' songwriting, "Marguerite" was composed in haste in a basement apartment in Western Newfoundland, inspired by a few paragraphs in a Reader's Digest History of Canada. Since then, the song has had an eventful afterlife. "Marguerite" was first used in a play in Corner Brook. It then passed from singer to singer across the island of Newfoundland until it caught the ear of noted Canadian composer Stephen Hatfield, who arranged it for choir and published it (without the songwriter's knowledge), assuming it was a traditional song. Every Newfoundlander he asked about the song tried to be helpful and instantly remembered her mother singing it around the house. The song has also been recorded by the up-and-coming Newfoundland trio The Once.

Barrett's Privateers

This song was adapted from a story told to Stan by Bill Howell in Halifax. Although Barrett, the Antelope and (at the time) the town of Sherbrooke did not exist and other specific instances mentioned in the song are fictional. "Barrett's Privateers" is full of many authentic details of privateering in the late 1700s.
